at the age of 76. Mr. Fairias-Choimeley, who was one of the largest landowners in Yorkshire, was a re sentative of a family descended from John

sentative of a ramity descended from John de Belwarde of Malpas, Cheshire, in the time of William Bufor, but which after wards settled in Yorkshire. He was the eldest son of the late Mr. Thomas Charles Cholmsley and his wife. Rossile, only doughter of Bir Charles Sirick-bard. land.

land. His uncle, Francis Choimeley, married a daughter of Charies Gregory Fairtax, of Guiling Catila and in 1868 Mr. Choimeley assumed the additional surname of Fairfax by Royal licence. He was sducated at Eton and concord University. When he succeeded to the Brandsby setter he residence of Makor Stanley Parson, which, together with other parts of the cents, he sold subsequently. At one time he owned practically the whale of the Singurgy ountrylide, but from time to time disposed of several portions of it, including firandaby Lodge and Mill Hill House.

A Social Reformer

A Social Reformer The was always interested in social reform. Early in the beginning of the present century he built the very fine rilispic hall at Brandnby, and was the leading figure in the establishment of the Brandsby Agricul-tural Trading Society, for which he built a large depol at Brandsby for the collection and distribution of the spicultural produce of his tenants and other agricultural produce of his transmission of the pioneer enterprises of cooperative trading in agriculture. In the cooperative trading in scientific to agriculture whited Brandsby to investigate the working of the society, which had another large depot at Malton, and which is still very successfully operated a very prominent part in all matters and discu-sions caused.

sions connected with agricultural estate management. A man of very varied interests and much intellectual curlosity. Mr. Pairtar-Cholmeicy expressed it in many semi-political and sociological directions. He combined a modified socialistic outlook with the staud-point of the old-fashioned Tory landowner. In religious matters he exercised a similarly wide tolevance. Mr. Pairfax-Cholmeley was patron of the living of Braidstoy.

Agriculture and Architecture

He displayed a keen interest in articul-ture, which found expression in the bread-ing of pedigree stock and the encourage-ment of his many tenants to adopt admini-tic methods in the cultivation of their boldings. holdings.

boldings. Ricenty interested in architecture, he was himself a very able amateur architect, devot-ing his talents in this direction to the cus-version of averal old-fachioned farm houses on his estate into delightful old-world

Tesidences. Among the houses so treated were Mill Hill, the former realdence of Mr. Oacar Bownitree, the White House, Brandsby, the residence of Mr. Paul Gobb, and the charming house at Swathgill, which he converted for his own use, and where he had resided for some eight

He was a JP and Deputy-Lieutenant for the North Riding. Apart from the usual eporting pursuits of the country gentleman Mr. Fairius-Chulmeley was a keen cricketer.

The death occurred at his residence, Swathgill, Hovingham, on Sunday, of Mr. Hugh Charles Fairfax-Cholmeley, at the age of 76.
