Rediscover Ruskin in Sheffield

Welcome to Ruskin in Sheffield, a programme of events and activities throughout 2015. The name John Ruskin rings a bell for many people, but exactly what did he have to do with Sheffield? And why rediscover him now?

John Ruskin was a renowned thinker, writer, artist and social reformer. He founded the Guild of St George in 1871 to help make the world a better place to live in.

140 years ago, John Ruskin chose Walkley as the location for St George's Museum to house a remarkable collection of paintings, drawings, architectural casts, books and minerals. Its purpose was to educate and inspire the metal-workers of Sheffield, whose skill he declared the best in the world. A radical venture. A year later, he bought a farm in Totley for a group of Sheffield working men to live and work on. Equally radical.

Ruskin in Sheffield reveals the highs and lows of Ruskin's Victorian ventures in Sheffield, offers a modern taste of what he meant by striving for 'better lives', and draws on his ideas about wealth to inform discussion of today's big issues.

These events and activities (most of which are free) have been created through the collective enthusiasm of many volunteers, community groups and cultural organisations in Sheffield. They have been working together with the Guild of St George, which owns and supports the Ruskin Collection at the Millennium Gallery. We are grateful for an award from the Heritage Lottery Fund which has made this project possible.

Rediscover Ruskin in Walkley, Rivelin Valley, Stannington, Totley, the city centre and beyond. Come and see how Ruskin's legacy continues to shape the story of Sheffield.




We meet in 1877 in Totley - a place of utopian dreams, and squabbling would-be farmers and bootmakers. Why did John Ruskin buy a farm here? How did it inspire other simple-lifers and land reformers eager to escape the smoke and dirt of the city?

This is a rural walk through time, near to St George's Farm. On the way we encounter loud-mouthed communist Mrs Maloy, sing to the sexy sage of Holmesfield Edward Carpenter, walk with King of the Ramblers Bert Ward, meet fruit-growing farmer George Pearson - and link hands with Ethel Haythornthwaite who dreamed the Peak District National Park.

If you've booked, meet 15 minutes before the start of the performance outside Cheshire Home, Mickley Hall, Mickley Lane, Totley, S17 4HE. The performance takes you on a 2.5 mile round walk up to Woodthorpe Hall (where drinks will be provided) which lasts about 2 hours. It ends at Totley Library for tea and cakes. Walking boots or shoes are essential as the path is steep and muddy in places. Some stiles. Bring waterproof clothing and a stick if you need one. No dogs please.


